

Superbonus, in Savona appeal by companies and unions to the prefect: “Urgent action is needed to release past credits”

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Savona. In Savona, the construction sector, affected by the blockage of credits relating to the Superbonus, is playing the card of a strong alliance between business and work. The Building Entrepreneurs Section of the Industrial Union – ANCE Savona, CNA Savona CONFCOOPERATIVE Liguria, LEGACOOP Liguria, FILLEA-CGIL, FILCA-CISL Liguria, FENEAL UIL Liguria have signed a joint appeal to the Prefect of Savona asking for urgent action to release previous credits , providing for “at least one intervention for the purchase of credits by a public purchaser of last resort also involving large investee companies, inviting credit institutions that still had the capacity to do so to purchase credits in the drawers of companies but above all immediately allowing Credit institutions to use the F24 to offset the credits accrued by businesses of all sizes, professionals and families”.

“In the letter – underlines Massimo Baccino, president of ANCE Savona – we point out the importance of including provisions and instruments in the law converting the decree-law approved by the Government, which urgently give an answer precisely on these points”.

In the letter, representatives of companies and workers submitted to the Prefect and the local offices a joint assessment of the effects that the Decree-Law 11-2023, in its current structure, would have on the Savona area if the necessary measures were not promptly taken by the Government measures to release problem loans and to plan support for the energy and seismic upgrading of Italian real estate assets for the next few years.

“The achievement of the ambitious international and European objectives on energy efficiency and environmental sustainability – the letter underlines – requires stable medium- and long-term public

support instruments to intervene on our building heritage, among the oldest and most energy-intensive on the continent, exposed to very high seismic and hydrogeological risks; and for energy-intensive properties owned by low-income families, instruments such as the transfer of credit and the discount on the invoice will be indispensable”.
